Halloween matchup would seem to benefit a team nicknamed Demons

A spooky Saturday night Halloween visit to Sam Houston State looms for Northwestern State, in front of the SLC TV cameras, with both squads desperate for a victory to end tailspins. The Halloween theme carries through to school colors - orange is the Bearkats' primary color, and a trim color for the Demons. No throwing pumpkins!

The last time the Demons played on Halloween was a Thursday night regionally-telvised home game against Sam Houston in 2002, won 38-10 by NSU.

The last Saturday Halloween outing for Northwestern came in a day game in 1998, when the Demons wound up the regular season ranked No. 2 nationally as Southland Conference champs. A 14-13 upset loss to Troy spoiled the day, but not a season that saw NSU host three playoff games and fall one win shy of the national title game.

All-time, Northwestern is 5-5 on All Hallows Day, including a 34-7 loss in a day game at Bowers Stadium in 1987.

Demon QB debuts have gone pretty well, except for the bottom line

True freshman QB Paul Harris made a big impression with his first start last week vs. Texas State. Harris accounted for 235 yards of total offense, guided a turnover-free offense to a season-best 285-yard rushing output and 402 total yards, the Demons' second best total in 2009.

He ran for 118 yards on 22 carries, becoming the first true freshman since 1998 (all-time rushing leader Tony Taylor) to run for 100+ yards in a game.

Harris completed 10 of 16 passes for 117 yards, and suffered at least 4 dropped passes.

Junior transfer QB Tyler Wolfe also shined in his first appearance, period, as a Demon vs. North Dakota on Sept. 19. He sat out the first two weeks with an injury.

Wolfe made his NSU debut a memorable one, posting the first 300-yard passing performance by a Demon since 2001, a 307-yard, 25 of 38 outing with TDs of 54, 3 and 9 yards.

NSU seeking long-overdue stability at QB spot

After Davon Vinson graduated following the 2005 season, Northwestern has unwittingly meandered through a virtual minefield with its starting quarterbacks.

Over the last 3+ seasons (41 games), the Demons have had 11 different players start at QB. Nobody has started more than 6 consecutive games.

2009 senior John Hundley had 11 starts in his two seasons. Germaine Edmond had 10 starts in 2006-07. Drew Branch got 5 starts in 2007-08, as did Ricky Joe Meeks and Roch Charpentier in 2006. Newcomer Tyler Wolfe has 3 starts this season. There's one start apiece for 2009 true freshman Paul Harris and 2007 walk-on freshman Carson Martinez.

In 2006, Meeks started the first 5 games, then left the team and football. Charpentier started the next 4 and the season finale, with true freshman Edmond getting a week 10 start vs. McNeese. Charpentier transferred and became Henderson State's career passing leader.

In 2007, Edmond started the first 5 games, was injured, missed the next one, then returned as the starter for the next 4 before an injury ended his season in week 10. Junior college transfer Branch started in week 6, playing basically on one leg and steering a win over Southeastern Louisiana. Third-teamer Adam Fayard played two series in week 6 at Nicholls before getting a season-ending injury in a game that saw three QB's knocked out of the contest, with Branch limping through the second half. After Edmond and Branch were knocked out again at McNeese, Fourth-team walk-on Martinez, the scout team QB, led an incredible second-half comeback there in week 10, and started the season-ending win over Stephen F. Austin.

In 2008, Hundley started the first 6 games, was injured and missed the next 3. Branch started the following 4 games, then Hundley returned to start the final 2.

This year, Hundley started the first 2, yielded to Wolfe as the starter in games 3, 4, and 5, returned for week 6 only to suffer a season-ending injury. Harris took over vs. Texas State and will start vs. Sam Houston.

Demons playing 14 true freshmen (7 starters) - ranking high in FCS

Northwestern enjoyed the acclaim of having Bradley Dale Peveto's first Demon recruiting class ranked No. 1 in the FCS last February by Rivals.com analysts.

Already, 14 of the highly touted 2009 signees have played and 7 -- WR Thomas Jackson, RG Destrly Hesskew, RT Larry Calcote, PK John Shaughnessy and WR/KR Bradley Brown and Phillip Harvey -- have started.

Also getting into action: TB Sidney Riley, WR Ridge Turner, DT Denzell Hawkins, NT Quinn Anthony, S Jamaal White, DT Lesley Deamer, and DT Anthony Gilbert.

A quick survey of the nation's FCS teams shows NSU ranks third in the number of true freshman playing and is tied for second in the true freshman who have started.

Presbyterian College (0-7) has used an FCS-high 17 true freshmen, starting 4.

Indiana State (1-7) has the most true freshman starters, 9. The Sycamores have played 13.

Portland State (2-6) has played 15 and is also starting 7. Western Carolina (1-7) has played 11 and started 7. Wofford (2-5) has played 10, starting 4.

In the FBS, Tulane has used a subdivision high 17 true freshmen. No stats on true freshmen starters were immediately available for FBS teams.

Jackson was the Demons' first signee under Peveto, coming in for the start of the spring semester from Hargrave (Va.) Military Academy. Riley was the last true freshman signee, springing out of May recruiting after an injury-interrupted senior season.

Six Demons nominated for Academic All-America

Northwestern submitted six players as nominees for ESPN the Magazine's Academic All-District VI team. Division I student-athletes from New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana and Mississippi are eligible if they have a cumulative 3.3 GPA, have spent at least one year on campus, and are important players for their teams. Sports information personnel at all levels in the district pick a first team (11 offense, 11 defense, 2 specialists) that advances for Academic All-America consideration alongside seven other districts. NSU's nominees go up against those from LSU, Texas, Ole Miss, Oklahoma, along with all Southland Conference teams, among others.

Nominees are senior DE Scott Wattigny (3.47 GPA, history), senior FB Quinten Goodie (3.52, computer information systems), senior QB John Hundley (3.54, business administration), sophomore OL Zach Case (3.49, health and exercise science), sophomore TE Justin Aldredge (3.90, accounting), and sophomore CB Phillip LeBlanc (3.32, business administration).

Demons-Bearkats series scoop

The teams first met 80 years ago, in 1929, and have played for each of the last 26 years since becoming conference cousins in 1983 in the short-lived Gulf Star before moving to the Southland in 1987. Northwestern leads the overall series 18-13, winning

10 of the last 16. In SLC games, NSU has a 12-10 edge.

Last year, the Demons stymied QB Rhett Bomar and posted a methodical 24-16 win in Natchitoches, halting a two-year Bearkats win string. Sam Houston rolled 42-20 over the Demons in their 2007 trip to Bowers Stadium.

The last NSU win in Huntsville came in 2005, 10-6, in a game that was the first in three weeks for both teams due to Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. Northwestern is 8-8 all-time in Huntsville.

Sam Houston and Northwestern tangled in a bowl game in Natchitoches in 1958, the Christmas Bowl, held on a bitterly cold Dec. 6 night after the downtown fireworks. A packed Demon stadium crowd of 6,000 enjoyed a halftime show featuring 23 bands who took part in the Christmas Festival parade earlier that day. Despite being credited with only 3 first downs to 18 for the Bearkats, the Demons prevailed, and allowed Sam Houston's only TD in the final seconds. That game was ranked among the Top 25 Games in Demon Football History in the 2007 Centennial Celebration.

Stoker, Beasley on opposite sideline now after last 7 seasons with Demons

Sam Houston State defensive coordinator Scott Stoker was NSU's head coach for the last 7 seasons, and had Bearkats' defensive backs coach Ben Beasley on his NSU staff over that span from 2002-08. Stoker was 43-38 as head coach at his alma mater, where he was a record-setting QB from 1986-89 and assistant coach from 1990-94 before coaching at McNeese from 1994-2001.

Stoker was inducted in the Graduate N Club Hall of Fame last October. He made the Top 100 Players in Demon History list for the NSU football centennial in 2007. He and 1938 All-American Walter Ledet are the only non-NFL players honored with pillar signs underneath the Turpin Stadium west grandstand among the 55 signs on display honoring Demon football.

Demons hoping to turnaround turnover margin

NSU is a minus 11 in turnover margin, suffering 7 interceptions and losing 12 fumbles. Opponents have suffered only 3 interceptions and lost just 5 fumbles.

The Demons haven't picked off an opposing pass in 4 games, since Wesley Eckles did against North Dakota.

Last week's Texas State game was the first time in '09 NSU has won the turnover stat, with the Demons not losing the ball and Scott Wattigny recovering a fumble.

The Demons haven't scored defensively in 10 games, since this weekend a year ago, when Kasey Brown ran back an interception 40 yards for the first TD at Texas State.

Game captains are Austin, Clark, Pollard and Elqutub

The Demons name their game captains, one from each unit, at the first practice each week. The captains this week - senior FB Dante' Austin (offense), DT Dennis "Tank" Clark (defense), CB Cashas Pollard and LB Yaser Elqutub (special teams).

Austin is from Galveston, a four-year letterwinner and three-year starter. Clark is a junior from Sibley-Lakeside, while Pollard is a sophomore from Tatum, Texas, and Elqutub is a sophomore from Houston-Cinco Ranch.

First 0-7 record since 1974

Coming into the season, it was clear to see the 2009 schedule was one of the most challenging in school history with two FBS foes and four Division I teams on the non-conference slate in September.

The margin for error wasn't great and against the FCS foes it's not been in NSU's favor. The 0-7 start is the first since 1974, ironically the first time the Demons met Grambling. The 1974 team lost its first 10 games, then slaughtered Southeastern 40-3. A year later, the Demons went 1-10 again, but the win came in the third week.

It's also the first time since 2005, and for only the second time since 1999, the Demons do not have a Division II opponent on the schedule. The last time they didn't

have a D-II team (26-1 vs. lower division foes since 1983) on the schedule in the first three games was 2006 (beat Arkansas-Monticello in week four).

Breaking down the breaking issues facing the Demons

Analyzing the first half of the season is difficult because of the disparity of competition. Playing a nationally-ranked FBS team (Houston) with two wins over Big XII foes (No. 5 Oklahoma State, Texas Tech) and another over an SEC opponent (Mississippi State), and a Baylor team which was expected to reach a bowl this season is hard to compare to the FCS foes and the SLC slate - which to date has featured two nationally-ranked foes.

The Demons have been hampered with personnel issues on the right side of the offensive line, extending out to tight end. It wasn't a surprise that Preseason All-SLC tight end Gordon Freeman stuck to his June decision to skip his senior year, dealing with a family illness, although Freeman reconsidered early in preseason camp.

It was a major setback to lose two stalwarts, RG Jace Prescott (knee vs. UH) and RT Jesse Hernandez (pneumonia, played only vs. UH). That resulted in true freshman Larry Calcote taking over at RT and true freshman Destry Hesskew moving in at RG. Hesskew began fall camp as a defensive tackle. Hernandez finally returned three weeks ago after recovering from a potentially-fatal illness that wasted away 30 pounds. He will return to the starting lineup vs. Texas State.

Sophomore Jeremy Lane, whose versatility made him a potential starter at CB and S, was sidelined and restricted for most of the last pre-conference three games. PR Jasper Edwards missed the last three pre-conference games thanks to an injury, and "returned" vs. UCA.

Clearly, having six turnovers returned for touchdowns is another major detriment, along with suffering a punt block for a safety. In fact, opponents have scored 43 points (including PATs) on defense/special teams, running back four interceptions and returning two fumbles for TDs.

Hand injury costs Hundley rest of season, Demons turn to newcomers at QB

First-year Demons Paul Harris and Tyler Wolfe are the top options at quarterback for the Demons after returning starter John Hundley had surgery Oct. 19 on his right (throwing hand). Wolfe is a junior transfer from Louisville. Harris is a true freshman. Both are from Baton Rouge.

The injury occurred in the fourth quarter Oct. 17 at McNeese when Hundley's hand, following through on a pass, struck the helmet of a Cowboy defender. Hundley continued to play five more snaps until the Demons lost the ball on downs in McNeese territory. Once his focus and adrenaline dropped on the sideline, the pain in his hand was enough for Hundley to reluctantly visit with trainer Jason Drury. He and Dr. Chris Rich, at Hundley's request, taped the hand to give him a chance to return to action, but the QB could no longer handle snaps and was benched.

Hundley broke the first metacarpal (bone) on his thumb. That is located at the base of his thumb and momentarily appeared as a dislocation, but quickly manifested as a fracture that after X-rays did require surgery.

His last game was his best in 2009 - 79 yards rushing, including an 11-yard TD, and 15-for-30 passing for 113 yards and a 14-yard TD on an athletic throw across his body while scrambling.

Hundley completed 54% of his passes this year (60-111) for 412 yards and 2 TD in 5 games. A two-year starter, he finishes with career totals of 1,719 yards and 10 TD passes in 15 games (11 starts) for the Demons, and set the single-game school record with 29 completions (44 attempts) last year in a 34-24 win at SFA, breaking a record set by Bobby Hebert.

Wolfe has a team-best 448 passing yards on 48-84 aim (57%) with 3 TD and 3 interceptions. He has 15 yards rushing on 8 carries. He started vs. UND, Baylor and Central Arkansas, then sat out vs. McNeese due to injuries to his upper torso, and played a

series at the end of the first half vs. Texas State.

Harris had his first flash of success against McNeese, running for 78 yards on 3 carries, including a 21-yard TD (his first) and a 46-yard run, while tossing for 19 yards on 2-5 aim. Overall, in 6 games he has 257 rushing yards, a 6.6 average per carry, and 140 yards passing on 13-25 aim.

Pickin' and grinnin'

Demons senior safety Wesley Eckles is making up for lost time -- he had no interceptions in his first 30 games, and now has 5 in his last 8 games.

Eckles has 3 interceptions in the last 6 games. Against North Dakota, Eckles picked a tipped pass and dashed 51 yards to the UND 3, setting up a Demon touchdown. A week earlier, he made 2 interceptions at Grambling. That was the second time in three games he had 2 "oskies" in a game, doing it in the 2008 season finale at Stephen F. Austin.

Before his two picks at SFA, the last time a Demon had two interceptions in a game was C.L. Grogan in the eighth game of the 2006 season, a 19-10 win over Texas State.

Castille cracks century mark in second Demon game

Junior transfer Quentin Castille has rushed for 100+ yards in two of his last seven games. He ran for 125 on 18 carries, highlighted by a 59-yarder, last January for Nebraska to key a come-from-behind Gator Bowl win over Clemson. He transferred to NSU last month and in his second game as a Demon, at Grambling, he had 18 carries, including a 59-yarder, and netted 114 yards rushing and his first NSU TD.

The Grambling performance was his third collegiate 100-yard outing. He ran for 102 yards as a true freshman against Oklahoma State.

Not stuck on 78 any longer, Griffin gets his first career 100-yard rushing game

Hard-charging senior TB William Griffin finally topped 100 yards vs. Texas State, getting 121 yards on 14 carries, including a 28-yard TD that gave NSU a fourth-quarter lead. His previous season high was 78 yards in each of the first two games, matching his season high from last year against Southeastern Oklahoma.

The Demons' Purple Swarm defense

The architect of the original Purple Swarm defense is back. While the Demons' defensive coordinator in 1996, Bradley Dale Peveto emphasized an attacking style and swarming the football. The catchphrase was "swarm, baby, swarm," and as a young defense began to turn heads, media dubbed it "The Purple Swarm." That nickname was solidified as NSU won Southland Conference titles in 1997 and 1998 and reached the FCS (then Division I-AA) playoffs both seasons, the semifinals in 1998.

This season signals a return to the 4-3-4 alignment used from 1996-2001. For the past seven seasons, NSU has employed an aggressive 4-2-5 scheme which also was very formidable in enhancing the Purple Swarm legacy.

Seven starters from last season were listed atop the depth chart this year: ends Ledell Love and Josh Daniels, nose tackle Albert Smith, linebacker Blake Delcambre, cornerback Kasey Brown and safeties Gary Riggs and Wesley Eckles.

Additionally, defensive lineman Scott Wattigny, cornerback Cashas Pollard, cornerback Jeremy Lane and linebacker Colby Arceneaux started at times last season.

The shift to a three-linebacker alignment gave starting opportunities to a pair of hard-hitting seniors, Isaiah Greenhouse and Rogers Loche.

Peveto is a hands-on coach defensively. He is coaching the linebackers. Co-defensive coordinator Brad Laird has been upstairs during games while co-coordinator Shawn Quinn and cornerbacks coach Terry Mills have been on the sideline.

The newly-branded Purple Strike offense

This spring, the Demons' offensive staff and players decided they wanted to develop

their own identity and came up with the "Purple Strike" nickname to describe the style of play under new offensive coordinator Todd Cooley.

Cooley called plays at Central Arkansas the last four seasons as the Bears moved into Division I for the 2007 season. UCA was 35-13 in his time on staff, and in the last two years in the Southland Conference, Cooley's offenses averaged 445 yards and 35 points per game. He has total control of the offensive strategy, says Peveto.

Returning as offensive starters were QB John Hundley, FB Dante' Austin, RT Jesse Hernandez, LG Michael Booker, RG (started at LT last year) Jace Prescott. Hernandez got the flu, it turned into pneumonia and he got out of the hospital after a life-threatening stay. He missed 3 games and returned to play as a reserve vs. UCA. Prescott suffered a season-ending knee injury in the second half at UH.

Expected to return was TE Gordon Freeman, but family considerations and having his degree in his pocket combined to cap his career a season early. Freeman gave up football in June and wavered on his decision briefly early in preseason camp.

Freeman's departure accentuated a largely unproven receiving corps. Veteran Darius Duffy is the only wideout back from 2008 with more than 6 catches (he had 19, third on the team). None of the tight ends had previously caught a pass for the Demons and Duffy was the only one of the top five receivers with career receptions.

A strength of the offense - senior fullbacks Austin and Quentin Goodie, whose modest rushing numbers (9 combined career carries entering the season) do not reflect their blocking significance.

Last year, four of the five starting linemen had never played for NSU before. Now, LT Zach Case, LG Michael Booker, RG Jace Prescott and RT Jesse Hernandez have a year under their belts and senior C Marcus Washington is a three-year starter.

WR coach Matt Kubik is upstairs along with RB coach Jeremiah Fiscus during games, while Cooley, OL coach Jeremy Offutt, and TE coach Brendan Farrell are on the field.

Cooley moved downstairs at McNeese for the first time since he coached at Arkansas Tech, and the Demons responded with a season-high point total and 380 total yards, their second-best production this fall. They added 402 yards vs. Texas State. With Cooley on the sideline, there's been only 1 turnover and an average of 391 yards.

The freshly-named Wild Demon special teams

Bradley Dale Peveto has extensive background in coaching special teams. He has worked with special teams coordinator Brendan Farrell in four seasons, the last three at LSU, where Farrell was an integral part of the Tigers' excellence in the kicking game.

The two are working closely together again at NSU.

The biggest question: can true freshman John Shaughnessy compensate for the graduation of record-setting four-year starting kicker Robert Weeks? Shaughnessy turned down Army, among others, to join the Demons and hit a 51-yard field goal to end the final preseason scrimmage. He has made 4 straight and 5 of his

last 6 FGs -- and hasn't missed since Farrell began growing a thick beard.

Junior Bradley Russo is back as the starting punter and the starting short snapper (FG, PAT). Russo sat out the McNeese game for disciplinary reasons but returned vs. Texas State. Punt snapper David Larsen is also back, as is holder Phil LeBlanc.

Several players are in the mix for return duties, with true freshmen Bradley Brown and Phillip Harvey first up. Senior Jasper Edwards is the first-team punt returner, but true freshmen Brown and Ridge Turner have filled in when Edwards was out with injuries.

"The Demon Deacons" provide leadership for NSU players

The team relies heavily on 13 "Demon Deacons," the team's leadership group. Coach Bradley Dale Peveto regularly consults with the Demon Deacons on issues big and small - to assure that players have real input into decisions that impact their NSU experience.

The Demon Deacons concept was initially used at Northwestern by one of Peveto's mentors, coach Sam Goodwin, the school's winningest coach in his 17 seasons (1983-99). Peveto came from LSU, where coach Les Miles and the Tigers followed the same approach with their "Unity Council."

The Demon Deacons are NT Albert Smith, DE Scott Wattigny, LB Rogers Loche, LB Isaiah Greenhouse, LB Blake Delcambre, DB Wesley Eckles, QB John Hundley, FB Dante' Austin, FB Quentin Goodie, WR Kenneth Charles, WR Jasper Edwards, OL Marcus Washington, and TE Justin Aldredge.

Staff composition a blend of newcomers and NSU veterans

Bradley Dale Peveto retained four assistant coaches from coach Scott Stoker's staff and added some key newcomers to the Demon football staff.

Brad Laird was the most predictable coach to remain at NSU. He was Peveto's first graduate assistant in 1996 when Peveto was the Demons' DC, and had been an outstanding DC in his own right for NSU since 2003.

Offensive line coach Jeremy Offutt had a good reference on his resume - LSU head coach Les Miles. Offutt was on Miles' coaching staff in 2004 at Oklahoma State and played for him there.

Receivers coach Matt Kubik and cornerbacks coach Terry Mills quickly impressed Peveto as he interviewed each assistant coach, and were retained. So was running backs coach Jeremiah Fiscus, who is a graduate assistant but has position coaching duties.

Coming in from LSU with Peveto was co-defensive coordinator and defensive line coach Shawn Quinn, and special teams coordinator and tight ends coach Brendan Farrell.

Offensive coordinator Todd Cooley joined the staff after four seasons in the same capacity at Southland Conference rival Central Arkansas.

Another key addition has been head strength and conditioning coach Joe Long, who was at LSU for several years and joined NSU after spending 2007-08 as an assistant at SMU.

Demons start fast with No. 1 class in FCS (Rivals.com)

That coaching staff put together a 2009 signing class ranked No. 1 in the nation in FCS football according to Rivals.com. The 26-

member class announced Feb. 4 included nine prospects ranked among the best in the country by Rivals.com analysts.

It included three of Rivals' 3-star recruits: WR Phillip Harvey, WR Thomas Jackson and ATH (now a WR/KR) Ridge Turner.

Two-star signees as rated by Rivals: DL Quinn Anthony, WR Bradley Brown, DB Jamaal White, DE Anthony Gilbert, DB Bert White.

Those rankings totalled 33 points for Northwestern, nine better than any other FCS program. Three-time FCS national champ Appalachian State ranked fifth (17), and 2008 FCS champion Richmond was sixth (15).

More newcomers could be big factors

Not counting in the Rivals.com rankings, but already having influence as newly-arrived Demons in 2009, are recent Big XII transfers Quentin Castille (TB, Nebraska) and Adrian Reese (WR, Texas Tech).

Two Big East Conference players are contributing. QB Tyler Wolfe (Louisville) and DT D.J. Shaw (West Virginia), like Castille and Reese, moved closer to their homes. Shaw did not play until the third game while establishing eligibility.

LB Bradley Roussel returned home to Louisiana from the University of Washington and saw his first action on special teams at Baylor. TE Kyle Howard (Grossmont College) is in the three-man rotation at tight end. OL Mark Cassimere (La. Tech) is on the travel squad.

Former FBS transfers figure prominently for Demons

In at least their second season as Demons are former Louisiana-Lafayette players John Hundley (QB), Darius Duffy (WR) and Jasper Edwards (WR/PR); former Louisiana Tech RB William Griffin, former Tulane LB Lamont Simmons, former Ole Miss signees Rogers Loche (LB), Colby Arceneaux (S) and Gary Riggs (S), and former Oklahoma State OL Michael Booker. All of those but Arceneaux and Simmons started against Houston, and they are second-teamers at linebacker.

Hundley persuaded Duffy to transfer last summer after Hundley made the move following the 2007 season.

Blending the new transfers (7) with the 9 former FBS transfers, along with former JC transfer William Davis, there are 16 transfers who are on the NSU travel roster.

Demon redshirts made their official college debuts

TE Wade Williams heads a group of redshirt freshmen who have been on the field for the first time as Demons. Williams started at UH.

Also on the two-deep: LG Jeff Bordelon, C Bryan Munch and LB Derrick Rose.

Position changes noteworthy

Starting true freshman RG Destry Hesskew was projected as a defensive lineman but moved across the ball two days into camp.

TE Wade Williams was a defensive end in the spring. TE Justin Aldredge moved from linebacker early in spring ball. Darius Perkins, who started the last 2 games at RG, was a TE last year and a LB and DE before that. He actually balked at returning for his senior year, but saw the opportunity for more playing time on

the offensive front. He worked at center in the spring and moved to guard in camp.

WR Jeremy Jefferson was an undersized TB in his first two seasons, but still set a school record with nine consecutive rushing attempts in a game as a true freshman.

RG Jace Prescott started at LT all of last season but moves inside in the new Purple Strike scheme. Backup RT Eric Pease was shifted inside from TE and is prospering.

LB Colby Arceneaux played safety last year. DE Scott Wattigny was an undersized DT, but a productive one, in his first three seasons.

Washington's 25-game starting streak over, aiming for 42+

Junior offensive lineman Marcus Washington missed the 2008 Cal Poly game with an injury, ending a streak of 25 consecutive starts. After starting at right guard for the first three games, he returned vs. Southeastern Oklahoma as the starting center, where he started every one of his first 22 games since his redshirt freshman year. He has started all of his 36 career games, and the last 15, including this season's 7. He's aiming for 42+ career starts.

Getting a kick out of the punt game

Having two punters named Russo is just one aspect of what certainly is a potentially bizarre scenario for the Demons in punt situations.

The starting punter will also snap on field goals and extra points, and could snap for punts. The backup punter was his high school team's backup punter.

Abbott and Costello would love NSU's punting situation, although "Who's Back to Punt?" wouldn't measure up to "Who's On First?"

Junior Bradley Russo took over the deep snapping in the fourth game of his freshman year (2007). He was a deep snapper by default, because South Terrebonne High School didn't have anybody else who could deep snap. Although he was the team's best punter, he went to snap. He punted 5 times his senior year and was the deep snapper for 4 years.

Now he's the Demons' best punter, but maybe the best deep snapper too. When he does snap for punts, he will be snapping to Nic Russo (no relation), a true freshman who wasn't the starting punter in 2007 at South Grand Prairie (Texas) HS, where Purdue sophomore Carson Wiggs was one of the nation's top prospects.

The NSU coaches saw Nic Russo in pregame warm-ups at South Grand Prairie in 2007 and were impressed with his hang time, then learned he wasn't even the starting punter. He did get to punt 6 times during the season and averaged just under 46 yards, leading his district.

All in the family

Sophomore Justin Aldredge and junior Colby Arceneaux had plenty of family tradition to consider when deciding to play at Northwestern.

Aldredge is the grandson of one of NSU's all-time greats, All-America end Corwyn Aldredge, who played two NFL seasons with Cleveland following his days as a Demon in 1962-64. Justin's father, Corwyn Jr., was an All-Southeastern Conference tight end at Mississippi State who played two NFL seasons in Tampa Bay.

His uncle, Duke Marcus, was a linebacker on the 1987 Northeast Louisiana (now Louisiana-Monroe) team that won the national FCS title (formerly Division I-AA).

Arceneaux's dad, Bryan, was a four-year letterwinner at defensive tackle from 1981-84, helping the Demons win the Gulf Star Conference title in his senior year. Then he coached for two seasons under Sam Goodwin.

Starting center Marcus Washington's dad played for Southern University.

Looking for a turnaround on the road

Since the start of the 2005 season, when some 2009 seniors entered the program, the Demons have a 5-21 record on the road. 0-4 this year, they were 2-3 last season after 0-6 in 2007, 1-5 in 2006 and 2-3 in 2005. NSU won its season finale in 2008 at SFA.

This is the 101st season of intercollegiate football at Northwestern State University, formerly Northwestern State College and Louisiana State Normal. Although football games were played against club teams, area high schools and town teams prior to 1907, the first intercollegiate game for NSU took place against Louisiana Polytechnic. It didn't end well, a 43-0 loss, but it started something big.

This is the 102nd year, and Saturday's game will be the 937th game, with Northwestern owning an all-time record of 493-406-22 (.550). The Demons celebrated their football centennial in 2007, highlighted by fans voting and a blue-ribbon committee finalizing a roster of the Top 100 Players in Demon History. Assistant coach Brad Laird was on the roster.

One of America's best defenders is kin of Demon great

Eric Berry, the highly-regarded safety for Tennessee, is the nephew of NSU great Arthur "Tank" Berry. The Vols' safety was featured in ESPN The Magazine with the story's author claiming Berry's uncle is the greatest defensive lineman in Northwestern State history. While it's subjective, it could be true, or it might have been a good natured jab at one of the Vols' coaches. Vols assistant head coach/defensive line coach Ed Orgeron, like Tank Berry, made the Top 100 Players in Demon Football History list in 2007. Berry was a 1984 All-American and the Gulf Star Conference Male Athlete of the Year.

His nephew is currently listed as the No. 2 NFL Draft prospect on Mel Kiper Jr.'s "Big Board."

Another SEC starter, LSU sophomore center T-Bob Hebert, is the son of Demon great and NFL star Bobby Hebert.

Demons are tough in Turpin

Northwestern has won 70% (110-47-1) of its games in Turpin Stadium. Since the start of the 1998 season the Demons are 46-14 (77%) at home.

Five times (1980, 6-0; 1982, 5-0; 1988, 5-0; 2002, 4-0; 2004, 6-0) Northwestern has gone unbeaten at home in Turpin Stadium.

New turf is most visible improvement for 2009 at Turpin

The brand-new V-Turf field (the 'V' could stand for "vibrant" or "vivid" but it actually stands for "Vibra") is the most apparent

upgrade for the 2009 season at 33-year-old Turpin Stadium, built on the foundation of storied Demon Stadium (the lower deck of the west side is the original Demon Stadium). It's not the only improvement.

Much of the exterior of the stadium has been painted purple -- all portals and the base of the walls bordering the field being the most obvious locations.

A lightning strike last year knocked out 24 of the 27 "woofers" on the new public address system, and that has been repaired to great benefit for fans in and around the stadium. The visiting radio booth has been relocated to the fifth level of the press box, its' original site.

The V-Turf is the major upgrade. The project was completed in mid-July at a cost of \$1 million, which included a complete redesign of the drainage system for the stadium. The surface is a product of Vibra-Whirl Sports, Ltd., a southern-based firm founded in 1952. Vibra-Whirl was one of the first companies to install the "infill" synthetic turf fields in 1998 and has installed more than 100 fields. After several years of research and experience installing other products, Vibra-Whirl designed its own V-Turf. It is designed to last longer than other surfaces due to higher specifications, notably a 42-ounce monofilament fiber with an all-rubber infill. The 42-ounce face weight of the fiber is four ounces heavier than the most prominent turf product nationally. The infill system prevents severe compaction (hardening of the field). It was installed over a new base material consisting of crushed stone rock for superior drainage. Recent rainy weather has proven the new surface does drain extremely well, and there is excellent traction for players on the field. The field colors are eye-catching.

Improvements in 2008 were installation of a \$1.6 million video scoreboard system and related signage, along with the replacement of fencing around the stadium and in the athletic complex with black wrought-iron fencing and brick columns. Among the Turpin Stadium signage are 55 "pillar signs" honoring the Demons' remarkable NFL legacy, with each NSU star who played at least one full season in the NFL being featured on an individual pillar sign under the west side of the stadium.

NSU's NFL tradition

Northwestern has a proud tradition of producing pro football players – and pro stars. Among the dozens of Demons advancing to the NFL have been eight who have become Pro Bowlers, nine who have played in the Super Bowl, one in the Pro Football Hall of Fame (Jackie Smith) and two in the College Football Hall of Fame (Joe Delaney, Gary Reasons).

Two (Bobby Hebert, Mark Duper) have been featured on the cover of Sports Illustrated.

All of the players who played at least one full season are featured with their own personalized displays on pillars underneath the west side of Turpin Stadium. Nearly two dozen others who went to NFL camps are listed on 2 more pillars.

Two former players coaching on Sundays this season

This season, there are 4 NSU alumni active in the NFL, 2 playing with the Buffalo Bills. Two more former Demon players are

coaching.

New Orleans Saints defensive line coach Bill Johnson and Philadelphia Eagles assistant strength coach Barry Rubin are on NFL sidelines each Sunday.

Johnson played center from 1975-78, and Rubin was a Jewish All-America tight end from 1978-80. Johnson and Rubin were student/graduate coaches and began their coaching careers here.

Rubin is in his 13th NFL season. He was formerly assistant and then head strength coach in Green Bay, and returned to the NFL ranks last summer with the Eagles.

Johnson is in his 10th NFL season.

2 Demons active on NFL rosters - both starting in Buffalo

Former Demon All-American Demetrius Bell started in his first regular-season action in the season's first NFL Monday Night Football at New England. Bell is the Buffalo Bills' left offensive tackle (No. 77). Last year, Bell was inactive for 15 games and was activated but did not play in the final game of the year.

Another Demon All-American, Terrence McGee is in his seventh season with the Bills having just signed the 2005 Pro Bowler to a long-term contract (4 years, \$27 million). McGee is a well-regarded starting cornerback who has also made a mark as a kick returner.

In 2005, McGee became the first player in NFL history to run back a kickoff and an interception for touchdowns in the same game (vs. Cincinnati). He shares the Bills' franchise record with 7 return TD (5 KOR, 1 int., 1 fumble).

Bell was a 2007 All-American for the Demons. He was a 7th-round 2008 NFL Draft pick by the Bills. He defied projections that had him, at best, making the practice squad, and in only his fourth year of playing football, his third as an offensive tackle, he was on the Bills' 53-man active roster but was inactive on the 45-man playing roster on game day in '08.

Fourth-year veteran cornerback David Pittman didn't make the Houston Texans after finishing 2008 with that team.

Pittman spent the previous two seasons with Baltimore, but accepted an injury settlement from the Ravens at the end of pre-season and was with the Saints briefly in midseason 2008. Pittman was a 2005 All-America for the Demons.

Rookie free agent receiver Dudley Guice Jr. didn't beat the odds and make the Tennessee Titans squad. Guice capped his NSU career last November with 11 receptions at Stephen F. Austin and was the Southland Conference Football Student-Athlete of the Year, having graduated with honors before the season.

He is now in the Canadian Football League with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers.

Another former Demon, 2004 All-American LB Jamall Johnson, is a veteran with the CFL's Hamilton Tiger Cats.

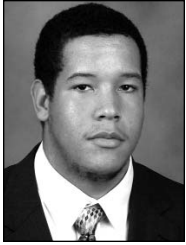
DEMON NOTEPAD

- Texas State, the nation's fifth-best scoring team with a 36.8 average, was held to nearly half its normal output.
- Paul Harris became the first NSU true freshman since all-time rushing leader Tony Taylor in 1998 to post a 100-yard rushing game. Harris got the start when senior QB John Hundley was lost for the year with a broken thumb sustained late in the McNeese game.
- Paul Harris and William Griffin gave the Demons their first 100-yard rushing tandem in the same game for the first time in two years. In the 2007 season opener against Henderson State, junior tailback Byron Lawrence ran for 138 yards and quarterback Germaine Edmonds added 122.
- It was the third straight three-point outcome between the teams in as many years, with all three games coming down to the final minute or overtime. Texas State damped NSU's Homecoming celebration for the second time in three years, winning by the same score two years ago.

After playing a vital role in a three-back rotation as a true freshman and sophomore at Nebraska, Castille joined the Northwestern State football program Aug. 23, practicing for the first time that afternoon. He was battling Roy Helu Jr. for the starting job at Nebraska. Castille was dismissed from the Cornhuskers team by head coach Bo Pelini for violating team rules, but Pelini strongly recommended Castille to his former LSU coaching colleague, Demon head coach Bradley Dale Peveto. Castille had offers from Oregon, Purdue, Memphis, South Florida and Texas Southern, but chose NSU because he said he felt most comfortable with the coaching staff and players.

Prior to NSU: Castille ran for 810 yards and 10 touchdowns in 25 games over two seasons. His last game for Nebraska was his best, in the Gator Bowl against Clemson, when he ran for 125 yards on 18 carries and caught a 20-yard pass to help spark a second-half comeback win. It was his second career 100-yard game.

As a freshman, Castille was Nebraska's second leading rusher with 76 carries for 343 yards, four touchdowns and carried a 4.9 yards per game average. In his college debut he rushed for 78 yards and two touchdowns on 18 carries against Nevada. His top game was against Oklahoma State where he rushed for 102 yards on 20 carries, including a 23-yard season-long run.

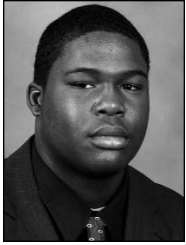
As a sophomore, Castille rushed for 467 yards and six touchdowns on 106 carries and averaged 4.4 yards per game. He also caught nine passes for 109 yards. Castille ran for 75 yards on 10 attempts in a win over New Mexico State. He rushed for 70 yards and a touchdown against Iowa State. Along with a career long 37-yard touchdown run, he also ran for 51 yards against Kansas State. With two of the team's three top rushers having to sit out with injuries Castille shined in the Gator Bowl, rushing for 125 yards on 18 carries. He also caught a 20-yard pass, playing a key role in a Nebraska rally from 21-10 down to win. He posted the two longest runs of his career in the Clemson game, second-half runs of 58 and 40 yards.

Castille in High School: Rushed for 1,200 yards and 11 touchdowns and earned All-District honors junior year... Rushed for 1,800 yards and 22 touchdowns, including a 300 yard and six-touchdown game, and also earned second team All-State and first team All-District his senior year... 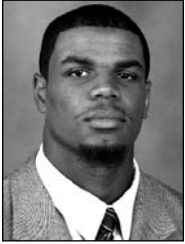

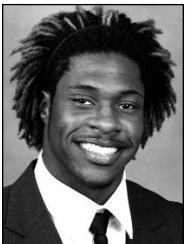

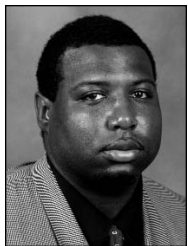
